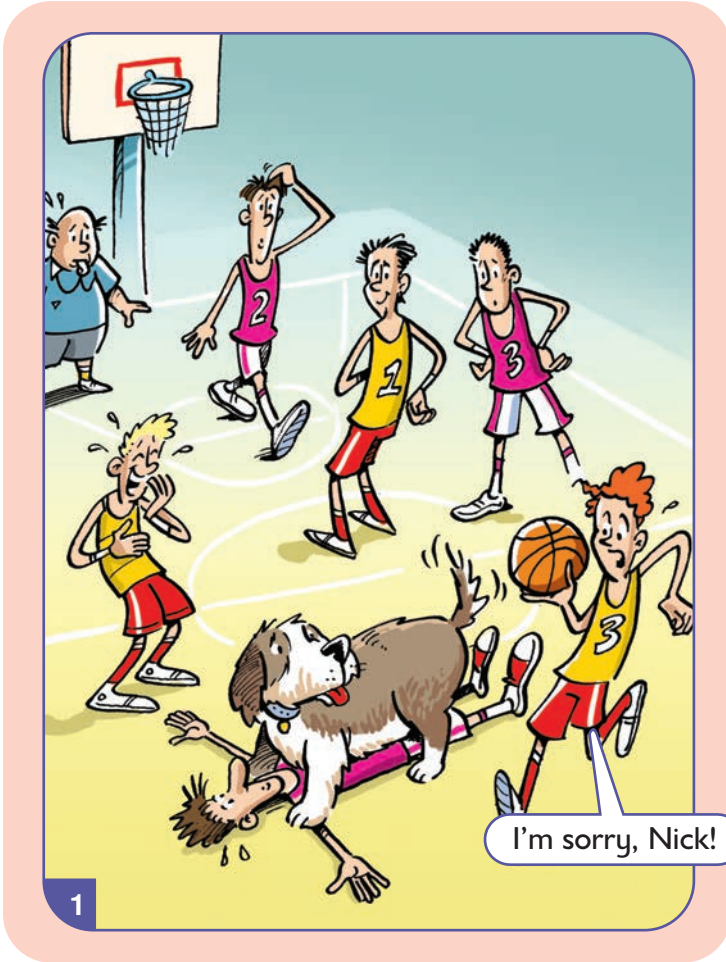

Past simple

Use

We use the past simple to talk about

- an action that started and finished in the past. We usually say when it happened or imply that it was a specific time in the past.

They went to Spain last year.

- a past state
- We lived in London in 2001.*

- a past habit
- He exercised every day when he was at college.*

Form

- To form the past simple of regular verbs, we add -ed or -d to the main verb.

jump → jumped try → tried

stop → stopped love → loved

- Irregular verbs don't form the past simple with -ed. Each irregular verb is different.

go → went get → got take → took

leave → left

- In negative sentences and questions, we use *did / didn't* and the infinitive. We don't use the past simple form of the verb.

She didn't answer the phone.

~~*She didn't answered the phone.*~~

Did they break the vase?

~~*Did they broke the vase?*~~

- The past simple of *be* is *was / were*.

Remember: we don't use *did / didn't* with *was / were*.

He was a good student.

We weren't cold last night.

Time expressions

We use these time expressions with the past simple:

- *yesterday, yesterday morning / afternoon / evening*
- *this morning / afternoon (when they are in the past)*
- *two hours / days / weeks / months / years ago*
- *last week / month / year / Saturday night*
- *in 2008 / June / the summer*

Used to

Use

We use *used to* to talk about past habits or states that were true in the past, but are not true now.

- *I used to stay with my grandmother every summer when I was a child.*

Past continuous

We use the past continuous to talk about

- an action that was in progress at a specific time in the past.

I was doing my homework at 6.30 p.m.

They were driving to work at that time.

- two actions that were in progress at the same time in the past. We use *while* to link the two sentences.

I was reading a magazine while the boys were playing in the garden.

While he was talking on the phone, she was drying her hair.

Past simple and past continuous

- We use the past simple and past continuous to talk about an action that happened (past simple) while another action was in progress (past continuous).

We were having lunch when we heard a loud bang.

- To link the sentences, we use *when* before the past simple and *while* or *as* before the past continuous.

It was raining when we came out of the cinema.

When the teacher came in, we were sitting down.

As she was looking through her papers, she found my diary.
